Diaconate Report

The Diaconate met at a special meeting after church service on May 6 to hear Annette Smith's Profession of Faith. We voted to recommend her for membership in our church. We will ask for a vote of the congregation at a special meeting June 3 for her to become a member of our church. The Right Hand of Fellowship will be extended to her as part of a regular Worship Service in the following weeks.

The Diaconate will be working with Pastor Frank on an Outreach Program. This Outreach Program will look to find ways to interact with the community and to make our community aware of who we are and what we do.

Pastoral Search Committee Update

The PSC is continuing its work on two fronts: talking with candidates and refining our requirements for a new settled pastor. These two are connected: our candidate discussions are helping us with refining requirements.

It is important that everyone understands that the candidate pool today is very different from the one we encountered fifteen years ago when we last searched for a new pastor. For example, there are currently very few young married male pastors available. Many candidates are coming to pastoring as a second career and thus are older. Women are a significant portion of the candidate pool. In short, the "typical pastor" of 15-20 years ago is hard to find within the pool of candidates seeking positions today.

Why is this important? The short answer is that it stretches out the process as your Search Committee sorts through which slices of the candidate pool would work in our church AND seeks to find appropriate candidates within those slices. In other words, the

pool that would "fit" our church is considerably smaller today than years ago. It is also challenging the Committee to consider options that are new to us.

We know that some are concerned that the search process is taking as long as it has thus far. We hope that this explanation will help in understanding the nature of the task we have undertaken. As always, we appreciate your prayers and support.

Missions Committee Report

Garfield collected Love Gifts from members who brought them to the meeting. This will be counted in June and sent as part of the Church's support of Love Gift. He encouraged all of us to reread the Love Gift Story posted on the Mission Committee Board and remember and support this offering.

Mission Committee Information for Special Offerings: These offerings are collected in the Offering plates and have designated months for their collection.

- The special offering for May was the **Church World Service Offering** and thanks to all of our members the total collected was \$174.
- The special offering for June is "One Great Hour of Sharing":

One Great Hour of Sharing is an offering that makes the love of Christ real for individuals and communities around the world who suffer the effects of disaster, conflict, or severe economic hardship, and for those who serve them through gifts of money and time. Today, projects are underway in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada. In the 1990s, receipts have exceeded \$20 million annually. While specific allocations differ in each denomination, all use their One Great Hour of Sharing funds to make possible disaster relief, refugee assistance, development aid and more.

Contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing make a difference in the lives of real people. Leaders of impacted communities identify the needs of their people. Priorities for short, medium and long-term solutions are then made for the purpose of improving the quality of life for individuals and the communities. Around the world, One Great Hour of Sharing continues to respond to needs equally critical as when it was first created.

Mission opportunity: Mary Blake writes to us from Texas:" This year I am going to the African country of Tanzania with Medical Missions!! We will be serving the medical, dental, and vision needs of their struggling communities". Property Committee Report

Property Committee met and discussed the following:

- Peter Williams, our custodian, has offered to mow the parsonage lawn this summer. Details will be finalized shortly.
- Fee schedules for the use of the Sanctuary, Russell Fellowship Hall, the kitchen, tables and chairs will be up-dated to reflect current expenses.
- John Renaud has provided a stencil so that the tables can be easily identified as well as stickers for the metal folding chairs.
- Big trash bin by the shed has been destroyed by the critters and it not a safe or attractive addition to the back yard. Steve will contact Harveys to discuss using roller barrels for the storage of trash and for ease in moving trash to the street.
- Ramp board replacement is under the direction of John Renaud. He will be installing composite wood that does not need the maintenance of the pressure treated wood now there. This will be a multi-year project as it is expensive.
- The lights in the church will be replaced by National Grid during the week of June
 Lights will be changed in Russell Fellowship Hall, the kitchen, the office and in the balcony and sanctuary.

Children's Sunday and Reception

Sunday June 10 will be celebrated as **Children's Day**. The youth of our church will be recognized and one campership will be given out. Alyssa Greenburg will be attending Aquarama Camp at Grotonwood August 5-10. Sunday School students will receive Certificates of Participation and teachers will receive Certificates of Recognition, and they will receive plants symbolizing Growing in God's Love.

After Morning Worship on **June 10** we will continue the celebration with a special coffee hour honoring our students and teachers. We will have a cake and, of course, our famous Baptist Green Punch. Plan to stay a bit longer and visit with the teachers, our campership recipient and enjoy the fellowship.

Additional Christian Education News

The Committee had hoped to sponsor a Vacation Bible School this summer during August. Unfortunately we have had no response from the local churches and so have shelved the plans. We hope that next summer we will have a better response and maybe even a group of children from our own church that would enjoy a special summer bible experience.

Summer Worship Services

Our summer services will start on June 17. During the summer, there will be no Children's Message. Informal Sunday School classes will be held beginning after the first hymn. If you would like to volunteer to help out with the Sunday School, let Susanne Fleming know so that some of the teachers may attend worship services.

Moderator's Corner

David and I have just returned from a trip that included the lovely city of Vienna. Here we experienced a new-to-us religious holiday - Whitsunday.

The name is derived from a practice in the early Church that made the celebration of Pentecost similar to the Easter Vigil. There was a service called "Whitsun Eve" where the new believers who had not been baptized at Easter received the sacrament on the eve of Pentecost. After the celebration of Baptism, the newly baptized would be vested in a white alb, symbolizing their new birth in the life of grace. The name white Sunday probably comes from the custom of wearing white robes by those newly baptized at this season. So even though priests wear red on this day, the ancient baptismal celebrations on Pentecost explain why it is traditionally called "Whitsunday." This is followed by Whit Monday when many of the stores are closed. Much different from our Pentecost Sunday where we wear red.

Finance Committee Update

As of the end of April, the church's year-to-date Operating income was \$1,840 (almost 6%) below budgeted expectations. The largest contributing factor was non-pledging envelopes, \$1,300 below budgeted expectations. The good news is that Operating expenses were lower than the income received.

Many thanks to all who have contributed to the financial health of our church during the first 4 months of the year. A special thank-you goes to all those who have organized, worked on, and supported the fund-raising events. Thanks also to the church's committees, which are managing their spending carefully.

For those people who use envelopes, please consider "catching up" with your giving if you miss a Sunday during the summer. Regular, consistent giving by all is the most important component of our church's financial stability.

Summer is the time of the year where the church's income dips due to people being away on vacation. However, the cost of operating the church continues (about \$2,000)
